In Remembrance of Antonio Johnson

Antonio Johnson was born on October 30, 1953 to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Antonio began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in Urban Studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrews Roman Catholic Church. Antonio worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as President, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength, and development.

Antonio single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work; he died at the age of 22 on February 8, 1976. Antonio will be remembered as a caring, compassionated, confident, and articulate individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. The scholarship is presented to an African American junior for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association, and community service. His sister Regina Miller said, "School was his life, it is a great honor to have a scholarship in his name."

The Black Student Association

During the 1960s, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African American students attending Xavier wanted the same privileges and opportunities as their white counterparts. In 1969, the university recognized the need and created the Urban Affairs Office, which was designed to assist African American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with the Urban Affairs Office, The Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American Student Association, was formed to help meet the needs of African American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins, and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization.

The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African American students at Xavier and serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership, and service to the community.

Rev. Oragyelo V. Sekov Keynole Speaker



Rev. Osagyefo Uhuru Sekou is a faculty member of the Graduate Urban Theological Studies Program at the Seminary Consortium of Urban Pastoral Education in Chicago, IL. He teaches a course on Preaching in the Urban Context. In February 2001, Rev. Sekou released a critically acclaimed work entitled, *Urbansouls*.

In this text, Rev. Sekou delves the spiritual crisis that besets America. With an organic eye and spiritual lens, subjects such as AIDS, religion, youth, popular culture, racism, sexism, and homophobia are examined with a fresh and new insight. Robin D.G. Kelly, Professor of Africana Studies at New York University wrote, "<u>Urbansoul</u> is the most eloquent mediation I have read on the urban condition."

Rev. Sekou and Corel West, Harvard University Professor of African and African-American Studies and the Philosophy of Religion, have embarked upon a national lecture tour, which will examine with the generation gap between the Hip-Hop Generation and the Civil Rights Generation. The tentative title of the work is *Over Troubled Waters: Bridging the Generation Gap.*

Currently, Rev. Sekou is the co-coordinator of Democracy Action Project hosted by the Institute of Policy Studies in Washington, D.C. The Democracy Action Project is an out growth of Democracy Summer, where over one hundred young people attended a training institute in response to the 2000 Elections.
