#### ~ In Remembrance ~

Antonio Johnson was born on October 30, 1953 to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Antonio began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in Urban Studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrews Roman Catholic Church. Antonio worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as President, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength, and development.

Antonio single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work, for he died at the age of 22 on February 8, 1976. Antonio will be remembered as a caring, compassionate, confident, and articulate individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. A scholarship is presented to an African American junior for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association, and community service. His sister Wanda Jones said, "school was his life, it is a great honor to have a scholarship in his name."

#### ~ Mistress of Ceremonies ~ Ms. Janelle Hines



Janelle Hines received a Bachelor of Science of Psychology from Xavier University in May 2002. As a student at Xavier, Janelle excelled academically, she was a Weninger Scholar and received the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Award in 2001. Janelle was not only a leader in the classroom, but she also received numerous awards for her involvement and leadership in the Xavier community. Janelle held executive positions in the Black Student Association and the Student Government Association; further she served as a mentor and tutor for Cincinnati youth as an undergraduate at Xavier. Janelle dedicated a summer to service at the Dominican Community Services, as a participant in the Summer of Service Internship Program. As an intern she helped young teenage mothers care for their children and

conducted teen support groups while interning at the downtown site.

After graduating from Xavier, Janelle continued to excel, driven by her passion for outreach supportive programming and community service, she accepted a research position with the Cincinnati Children's Medical Center. As a member of a research team Janelle focuses her career on researching health disparities and community issues with minorities. Janelle has given much of her time to researching Sickle Cell Anemia and Rapid Repeat Teenage pregnancy in the African American community.

In her research about Sickle Cell Anemia, a widely under researched disease that plagues a large percentage of African Americans, she studies the impact of Sickle Cell on the health of children and the effects on the family dynamic. Janelle research on Rapid Repeat Teenage pregnancies, which is linked to a variety of social issues and childhood sexual trauma, tracks the progress of young mothers and their families having an ultimate goal of breaking the cycle of under education, poverty and other ailments within this group. In addition to her contributions as a researcher she also is responsible for conducting psychological testing to improve school readiness for the Cincinnati Public Schools. She also conducts consultation groups in Cincinnati and other surrounding cities to learn more about the impact of child health issues in families.

After completing her work at Children's Hospital, Janelle plans to pursue her doctorate in clinical child psychology. Her future goal is to direct a community based mental/social health facility for at-risk youth and under privileged families.

#### — History of the Black Student Association —

During the 1960's, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African American students attending Xavier in the '60's wanted similar privileges and opportunities as their white counterparts. In 1969, the university recognized the need and created the Urban Affairs Office, which was designed to assist African American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with the Urban Affairs Office, the Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American Student Association, was formed to help meet the needs of African American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins, and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization.

The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African American students at Xavier and serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership, and service to the community.
