IN REMEMBRANCE

Antonio Johnson was born October 30, 1953, to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Johnson began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in urban studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrew Roman Catholic Church. Johnson worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as president, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength and development.

Johnson single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work because he died on Feb. 8, 1976, at age 22. Johnson is remembered as a caring, compassionate and confident individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. A scholarship is presented to an African-American junior for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association and community service. Johnson's sister, Wanda Jones, said, "School was his life; it is a great honor to have a scholarship in his name."

CHARLES DICKSON



Charles Dickson was born in Los Angeles and is a communication arts major with a concentration in electronic media. Dickson was given an academic scholarship and grants for his achievements in high school. During his freshman year Charles was a Division I athlete who walked onto the Xavier baseball team. He also became a member of Gentlemen Organized for Achievement and Leadership (GOAL), the Black Student Association and Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity Inc. After being released from the baseball team his sophomore year, Charles became a vocal member of GOAL and was appointed head of the social committee.

This year Charles is the president of GOAL and head sports anchor/director/producer/editor for the Xavier television station. He is also the vice president and charter member of the Gamma Alpha Iota Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. Charles has been involved in Manresa 2009, Community Action Day and Xavier Christmas. In December, with the help of his fellow brothers, Charles helped create a program called Project Sigma's Waging War Against Cancer. The locks he had been growing for ten years was cut off in support of breast cancer. This current semester he was accepted as an intern for WLWT-TV Channel 5 Sports. Charles was hired as a Xavier University representative by CBS SportsLine and is currently working on a diversity project that will be released this April.

LEON HAMPTON



Leon Hampton was born January 21, 1988 in Harlem, New York. The importance of education was instilled in him by his mother, Jennifer Hampton. This message is one Leon took very seriously because he knew education would be the key to success and open doors that were closed previously to his family. Leon's academic prowess earned him a scholarship to one of the best high schools in New York City. His dedication to education helped him to excel and earn another academic scholarship to Xavier University. He continues to display his love for academics by consistently earning Dean's List honors, which he hopes will help him

enter law school in the Fall 2010.

Leon believes to whom much is given much is expected. This past summer, he served as a litigation and government relations intern, at the law firm of Hester & Waters in Chicago. During his internship, Leon played an instrumental role in providing the legal research necessary to help many families of the Great Migration regain their rightfully owned lands in the South and turn them into assets. This push attempted to correct one of America's long lasting disparities of land owned by Black Americans. He has been an active part of the Xavier University community since his freshman year. Leon is the Student Director of Diversity, where he has served as an advocate and point of contact for students of diverse populations. He also has helped charter the Gamma Alpha Iota chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. at Xavier University. He is a member of Mortar National Senior Honor Society, Gentleman Organized for Achievement and Leadership and the Black Student Association.

THE GREGG BACON QUARTET



Indianapolis native Gregg Bacon has been "makin' bacon" with his sizzling saxophones for 35 years. "A recycled R&B guy" who has sung background and played the blues, Bacon is one of the most versatile entertainers in the nation, playing 12 horns and the flute. His latest album, "Our New America," captures the essence of this extraordinary performer. Bacon taught himself to play two saxophones at the same time, and eventually added a third instrument, turning himself into one of the hottest showmen on the jazz scene.



KEYNOTE SPEAKER

TONY ANDERSON

Tony Anderson is a music producer and manager, educator, researcher, and Ph.D. candidate at the University of Delaware, where he was recently awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award, the university's highest teaching honor. Anderson is credited with being one of the foremost thinkers and researchers on hip-hop pedagogy, an educational theory that involves exploring the instructional and entrepreneurial possibilities of hip-hop culture.

His proudest moment involves the creation of Bassline Entertainment, an after-school program he developed with the assistance of education professor Shuaib Meacham and teacher Jennifer Bishop. Initially the goal in establishing the group was to help academically engage students who had been historically resistant to traditional educational approaches. This after-school program ultimately evolved into a summer camp and a professional performance group that toured the United States and Europe. While in Europe, aspects of Anderson's hip-hop pedagogy curriculum were adopted into the Sheffield, England school curriculum and standardized testing program.

Bassline has also produced three albums and has been featured in numerous educational and mainstream publications. Bassline shared the stage with numerous hip-hop icons including P. Diddy, Mary J. Blige, Russell Simmons, Busta Rhymes and B2K, among others. In addition to Bassline's numerous artistic achievements, 100 percent of its students received admission to four-year colleges and universities, with many of the students receiving music and performance-based scholarships.

Anderson is now a highly sought-after educational consultant and lecturer with Counter Current Consulting. He also works professionally in the music industry as a producer and manager with an array of musicians, from Grammy Award winning artists The Roots to popular actress and singer Zoe Kravitz to Grammy Award winning producers Dre & Vidal. He has also consulted on projects for Al Green, Jill Scott, John Legend and others.

Anderson has been featured or quoted in over 20 publications, including the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, AllHipHop.com and *Vibe* magazine. He has also given over 50 professional presentations on hip-hop culture in the United States and Europe. He is now working on the creation of an entertainment technology and recording arts conservatory in Philadelphia. Tony Anderson believes that he is just getting started in his efforts to change the world through music.



HISTORY OF THE BLACK STUDENT ASSOCIATION

During the 1960s, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African-American students attending Xavier in the '60s wanted privileges and opportunities similar to those of their white counterparts. In 1969, the University recognized the need and created the Urban Affairs Office, which was designed to assist African-American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with the Urban Affairs Office, the Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American Student Association, was formed to help meet the needs of African-American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization.

The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African-American students at Xavier, and it serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership and service to the community.
