In Remembrance

Antonio Johnson was born October 30, 1953, to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Johnson began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in urban studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrew Roman Catholic Church. Johnson worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as president, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength and development.

Johnson single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work because he died on Feb. 8, 1976, at age 22. Johnson is remembered as a caring, compassionate and confident individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. A scholarship is presented to an African-American junior for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association and community service. Johnson's sister, Wanda Jones, said, "School was his life; it is a great honor to have a scholarship in his name."

Anthony Darnell Davis



Mr. Davis graduated in 1972 with Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from Xavier University. During his years at XU, Mr. Davis served two terms as President of the Black Student Association, was a member-at-large to the Student Senate, and served on the Human Relations Committee. He was an Archbishop's Scholar and McCall Scholar and was selected to Who's Who in American Universities. He was a guest columnist for XU News and was a member of the Pershing Rifles.

For his graduate studies, Mr. Davis selected the University of Cincinnati. He enrolled in dual Master Degree programs in Community Planning and Educational Administration. He graduated

in 1974 with his MCP in Community Planning and his M.Ed. in Educational Administration. He is ABD for a doctorate in Education.

As an educator; Mr. Davis worked as an Adult Leader/Health Education Specialist with the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center for over 18 years. He began as a faculty member at the University of Cincinnati in 1984. In 2000, he began teaching Black Drama I and II, and Black Drama Studio.

His honors included: Outstanding Young Men in America-1984; Lloyd Richards Award for Theatre Directing; Black Theatre Festival Appreciation Award; Maurice McCrackin Peace and Justice Award; Shelby Taylor Artist Appreciation Award - 2000; Mallory Center New Voices Award, 1999 (Outstanding Poet & Literary Achievement); Applause Magazine 1998 Image Maker Award; the 2002 Spirit of Black Theatre Award; and the 2004 Lloyd Richards Award for Theatre Directing.

In 2011, Mr. Davis will publish 12 books of poetry, two children's books, and produce 6 plays written my Cincinnati area playwrights.

HISTORY OF THE BLACK STUDENT ASSOCIATION

During the 1960s, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African-American students attending Xavier in the '60s wanted privileges and opportunities similar to those of their white counterparts. In 1969, the University recognized the need and created the Urban Affairs Office, which was designed to assist African-American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with the Urban Affairs Office, the Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American Student Association, was formed to help meet the needs of African-American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization.

The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African-American students at Xavier, and it serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership and service to the community.
