

IN REMEMBRANCE

Antonio Johnson was born October 30, 1953, to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Antonio began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in urban studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrews Roman Catholic Church. Johnson worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as president, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength and development.

Johnson single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work because he died on Feb. 8, 1976, at age 22. Johnson is remembered as a caring, compassionate, confident and articulate individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. A scholarship is presented to a junior of African decent for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association and community service. Johnson's sister, Wanda Jones, said, "School was his life; it is a great honor to have a scholarship in his name."

HISTORY OF THE BLACK STUDENT ASSOCIATION

During the 1960s, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African-American students attending Xavier in the '60s wanted privileges and opportunities similar to those of their white counterparts. In 1969, the University recognized the need and created the urban affairs office, which was designed to assist African-American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with the Urban Affairs Office, the Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American student association, was formed to help meet the needs of African-American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization.

The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African-American students at Xavier, and it serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership and service to the community.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Ruby Bester

Ruby Fredricka Shuttlesworth Bester, second daughter of Rev. Fred L. and Ruby K. Shuttlesworth was born in Mobile, Alabama on January 7, 1945. Her siblings are Mrs. Patricia Massengil, Mr. Fred Shuttlesworth, Jr. and Dr. Caroyln Shuttlesworth. The family moved to Birmingham in 1953 when Rev. Shuttlesworth was called to pastor, the now Historic (2004), Bethel Baptist Church. He was serving as membership chairman of the NAACP in 1955 when the state of Alabama outlawed the NAACP. Rev. Shuttlesworth organized the Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights – an organization that met every Monday night to pray, sing and strategize for human dignity and civil rights in city nicknamed "Bombingham". Their home was bombed Christmas night. On December 26, 1956, the next day, Ruby rode the segregated buses in Birmingham with her father and others from

the movement and sat in the front of the bus. In September of 1957 Rev. and Mrs. Shuttlesworth attempted to enroll Pat, Ruby, and Nathaniel Lee in the all-white (segregated) Phillips High School. Rev. Phieffer drove the car. Rev. Shuttlesworth was severely beaten and Mrs. Shuttlesworth was stabled in the hip. A lawsuit was filed, Ruby Fredricka Shuttlesworth vs the Birmingham Board of Education. In 1957 Dr. Martin L. King, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, Rev Shuttlesworth and others organized the Southern Christian Leadership Conference SCLC. In 1960 Ruby, Pat, and Fred, Jr. spent 6 weeks at Highlander Folk School in Montheagle, TN. They were arrested for sitting on the front on an Interstate Bus. Ruby graduated from A.H. Parker High School May 31, 1961. She attended the University of Cincinnati and earned a BS '71 in Education of Deaf and Hard of Hearing student and a Masters '75 in Special Education. She heard her father speak at the 1963 March on Washington. Ruby married Rev Harold H. Bester in June 1965. They have two children Mrs. Audra Bester-Coley and Minister H. Steven Bester, six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Mrs. Bester taught special education and served as Special Education Department Head at Princeton Jr High for 26 to 30 years. She is a choir member, youth supervisor and Vocal Choir president at Greater New Light Baptist Church. Mrs. Bester is amember of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Her favorite times are spent with the youth and the elderly, sharing teaching, and ever being aware of God's Grace and Mercy.

Damon Jones

Damon Jones believes passionately in the power of communication to create connections, open hearts and change minds – the foundation of a professional career that spans ve cities in four countries over three continents – and a track record of community engagement rooted in Jesuit ideals.

He was a founding Board Member of the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center and currently serves as a political appointee to the Greater Cincinnati Redevelopment Authority in addition to his second term as a member of Xavier University's Board of Trustees.

A proud Xavier alum, Jones graduated Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Communications During this time at Xavier, he was active in many campus organizations and is the only student to be twice elected to serve as the President of Student Government Association.




Andrews Beniana




